# We are learning to:

Spelling and Vocabulary

Our focus area within our spelling and vocabulary this week is to be aware of which of the four types of spelling knowledge we are using when completing the activities.

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The four forms of spelling knowledge:

#### **Phon**ological knowledge:

An understanding of phonemic awareness (being able to hear the sounds in words and manipulate them).

#### Visual knowledge:

Understanding the way words and letter combinations look.

#### Morphemic knowledge:

Understanding the meaning of words and how spelling differs when they change form.

#### **Etymological** knowledge:

Understanding the origin of words.


