
# Who Sank the Boat?

## **Grammar and Punctuation**



An exclamation mark is used at the end of a sentence to show a strong feeling or emotion, like joy, anger, sadness or surprise.



Wow! The boat is starting to sink!

Sentences end with an exclamation mark. For example:

- I can't wait to go for a row on the water!
- The boat is going to sink!
- Stop!
- Help!

Add an exclamation mark, a question mark or a full stop at the end of each sentence.

- I am trying hard not to sink the boat
- Have you eaten breakfast

I love being in the boat with my animal friends.


# Question

A sentence that asks for an answer. A question ends with a question mark.

Do you mind getting wet when you are rowing the boat?
